Political Notebook – September 2009

A monthly activity report from the British Furniture Confederation

1. Pre-Budget Report submission to the Treasury

The BFC has made a submission to the Treasury's Pre-Budget Report consultation. The Pre-Budget Report, scheduled to take place at the end of November, is an important opportunity to communicate the views of British businesses on budgetary and taxation matters. The BFC's letter, which has been signed by all members of the executive committee, sets out the key economic and business issues, identified by BFC members, which affect the furniture industry. The submission highlights three key areas where the Treasury could act to support the furniture industry.

Firstly, the BFC has asked the Government to consider a time extension to the Trade Credit Insurance top-up scheme, in order to protect firms over the Christmas period. The BFC has also asked that cover be expanded to protect firms which have found their insurance completely removed.

Secondly, the BFC has called on the Government to consider the introduction of a consumption tax. By removing the social security charges and related taxes paid at the point of manufacture, and instead replacing those with a rise in VAT for labour-intensive products at the point of sale, the Government would reduce those labour costs that are constantly scaled up through the supply chain from factory to show room. Projections have shown that this would have the effect of reducing final sale price; reducing the cost to manufacturers; and ensuring that the level of tax taken by the Exchequer would remain constant.

Thirdly, the BFC have asked the Treasury to consider the possible benefits of assisting with exports for SMEs, through the introduction of an Export Tax Credit Scheme. By providing financial relief from Corporation Tax for exporters in the form of Export Tax Credits, the Government would create a financial incentive for growth that would benefit those companies who sought out new markets for British trade and, ultimately, benefit the whole of the UK economy.

The BFC hopes to continue to contribute to Treasury policy development and will submit another policy consultation letter ahead of the Budget in the Spring. They are happy to accept any suggestions for policy ideas which would benefit the British furniture industry, and people are welcome to email the secretariat with ideas.

2. Conservative export trade consultation

Conservative MP for Shrewsbury, Daniel Kawczynski, is preparing a report for the Conservative Party on the experiences of British exporters and problems they have had with

3. Skills intensive industries

The BFC is currently organising the first ever joint policy meeting for the trade bodies representing skills intensive industries. Organisations representing a wide range of industries, such as ceramics, textiles, footwear, woodwork and printing have been invited to take part in the forum to identify common areas of interest and coordinate mutually beneficial lobbying efforts. The BFC intends to use the meeting to discuss its policies on the failure of Regional Development Agencies and a potential Consumption Tax. The date for the meeting is 12th November at the WCFM, Austin Friars, and further details will be forwarded when they become available.

4. Early Day Motion update

The current Early Day Motions will fall and become defunct after the Queen's Speech on the 18th November. Although MPs can still sign our existing EDMs, their signatures will only be held for the two weeks which Parliament sits before the Queen's Speech. Because of this the BFC is working with Madeleine Moon, Chair of the Furniture All Party Parliamentary Group to consider our future Parliamentary campaigns and will update members shortly.

That this House acknowledges the importance of the furniture manufacturing industry to the UK economy, with an annual output of almost £10 billion and direct employment of around 124,000 people within 7,500 enterprises; further notes the problem of obtaining credit insurance in light of the economic downturn particularly in the furniture manufacturing industry; and recognises that credit insurance companies are promoting panic by removing insurance cover from furniture manufacturers and their suppliers, often without basing such action upon the risk involved or the financial viability of the individuals or firms involved.
